Performances run January 25 – February 2, on Fridays and Saturdays at 7:30pm and Saturdays and Sundays at 2:30pm.

Studio East presents the Bard's famous play, *Romeo & Juliet*, in March. Studio East's version, directed by Simon Pringle, is set in West Virginia in the 1870s. In a Hatfield & McCoy

version of the classic tragedy, we see the same themes of revenge, love, a secret marriage and a long feud between the Montague and Capulet families, all with a 19th century twist.

Romeo & Juliet is recommended for ages 9+ and has a running time of approximately 2 hours with intermission. Adult tickets are \$19, while students and seniors are \$17. Tickets can be purchased at www.studio-east.org. All performances are at the Studio East Mainstage Theater located at 11730 118th Ave NE in Kirkland. Performances run March 1-3, with the following show times: March 1 @ 7:30pm, March 2 @ 2:30pm & 7:30pm, and March 3 @ 2:30pm.

Finally, StoryBook Theater debuts a new musical, **The Little Engine That Could**, in partnership with AAA Washington. This show follows a broken-down engine struggling to deliver her toys to the children on the other side of the mountain. There are many trains who are willing to help, but they all seem to have more important things on their minds. The focus of Little Engine is *believing in yourself*, and the musical also weaves in messages about traffic safety and distracted driving.
